Thanks for the update on Camp Roosevelt. I remember Roosevelt being around for several years after Goshen opened. I worked on the staff of a cub scout camp there in the summer of '69 or '70. We also held Sea Explorer Regattas and Snug Harbors there as late as '71 or '72.

I remember when Goshen opened and I still have the bronze medal that we all got the first year. We were all wowed by the new modern camp in the mountains. Goshen had a certain flash and excitment that was not found at Roosevelt, and I presume, at Wilson or Thunderbird although I never attended those camps.

I have lived outside of NCAC since 1976 although I did go back to Goshen in 84 through 86 with my troop from the Blue Ridge Mountains Council. That is not quite out of council for us since Goshen is about half the distance from here as it is from DC. Goshen had not changed and my son who was nature director at Olmstead this year and reports the Goshen is still Goshen (sans lake temporarily).

I think that Roosevelt had an individual character that the camps at Goshen with thier cookie cutter facilities and interchangable staffs and programs have not yet attained. Maybe they will. A couple of more years and Goshen will be thirtysomething. When Goshen opened, it did not take much to see what we had gained. It has taken almost thirty years for me to see what we lost.
