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#### ANNOUNCEMENT OF AN EMAIL JAMBOREE **IN PARALLEL WITH JOTA'94**

#### **OVERVIEW**

The objectives behind the Scouting & Guiding Movements all round

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with

world running their annual Jamboree of the Air (JOTA) is for Scouts/Guides to make friendships with other Scouts/Guides all round the world. This year Mosman District Scouts, located in Sydney Australia, will extend the basic concept of JOTA to include the use of electronic mail (email). This will be brought about by creating a direct connection for Mosman District Scouts and Guides to the Internet. Internet is an international network of some 20 million computers which can exchange email messages and news broadcasts

each other.

Most international, commercially-based and hobby-based email networks,

HOW	WILL IT HAPPEN

#### At 1st Balmoral Sea Scout Hall Mosman District Scouts, Guides, Brownies, Cubs, Rovers, Rangers, Venturers and their Leaders will be broadcasting on 2 or 3 amateur radio rigs provided by a local radio club. There will also be a dial-up phone link between a UNIX computer called 'scoutnet', and a commercial UNIX email service. This service is linked to AARNET, which in turn is linked, via an international gateway located at the University of Melbourne, to the Internet.

In the weeks leading up to JOTA which happens worldwide on during October Scouts and Guides will be able to use the email service to pre-arrange times and frequencies for radio contact with other Scouts/Guides.

They will also be able to use internationally distributed news groups to broadcast written articles to people associated with Scouting/Guiding in one role or another. One of the most appropriate newsgroups for Scouts/Guides is called "rec.scouting".

If you know the email address of another Scout/Guide then they can send a persoanl message to them.

37th Jamboree-On-The-Air, 15 - 16 October 1994.

Dear friends,

This is a fil reminder that the 37th JOTA will be held over the weekend of 15 and 16 October 1994.

Details of the JOTA organization are published in the first JOTA circular, issued in May 1994. This circular contains some last-minute information.

The JOTA is a world-wide event. Units may operate for 48 hours, from Saturday 00.00 h until Sunday 24.00h local time. Due to the world's time differences, this period is not the same for everyone. To determine the times at which you can most likely contact a certain part of the world, calculate the time difference and ask your amateur radio operator about the radio propagation prediction (a sort of weather forecast for radio waves).

Members of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) are kindly invited to take part in the JOTA and enjoy this international event together with the Scouts.

National JOTA Reports.

National JOTA organizers are requested to send a report to he World Scout Bureau soon after the event.

What is a good report? A National JOTA Report gives an impression of what the JOTA was like in your country. It contains ideas and comments, suggestions for future programmes and describes the most important and interesting contacts that were made. A summary of it will be published in the World JOTA Report, so others may benefit

#### from it.

The World Report editor would very much appreciate it if you could send your additional report text in English on a computer disk. You may use any MS-DOS or Macintosh formatted disk with the text in ASCII format or formatted according to any popular word processor, like Wordperfect, MS-Word, Wordstar or similar.

Send your report to the World Scout Bureau before the 31st of December 1994 !!

#### The JOTA map game.

Map co-ordinates for the JOTA map game have been distributed to various countries. The format in which Scout stations will transmit the co-ordates during a contact is:

AABB N CCDD E.

In this format AA and CC represent degrees whilst BB and DD are minutes. The N stands for Northern Latitude and the E for Eastern Length. We wish you many happy hours with this map game and are looking forward to see your solution.

**HB9S** activities.

The World Scout Bureau's radio station HB9S will operate from Geneva, most of the Saturday and Sunday, with short breaks during the night. Transmitters will be on the air simultaneously on the 10/15/20 metre, 160/80/40 metre and 0.7/2 metre bands. The station manager Yves Margot,

HB9AOF, will be assisted by Richard Middelkoop, PA3BAR, World Bureau staff members and an international team of scout radio amateurs. HB9S will transmit a JOTA message delivered by the Director of UNICEF, Mr. Jim Grant, according to the following schedule on Saturday 15 October: directed towards:

Making a contact with HB9S takes some patience in practice. Usually many stations are calling at the same time. Please follow the instructions given by the operators and do not interfere with on-going contacts. The operators will do the best they can to make contact with scout stations world-wide and speak to scouts in as many languages as possible.

QSL card competition.

Details of the QSL card competition for JOTA participants were published last May. May we remind you that: entries for this competition need to be received on time in Geneva, i.e. before 31 December 1994.

Asia-Pacific Radio-Scouting Seminar.

The first Radio-Scouting Seminar for National JOTA Organizers in the Asia-Pacific Region takes place 2 - 4 January 1995. Your application to participatein this seminar must reach the organizers before 31 October 1994. Your National Scout Headquarters has the application forms. For further information contact the Australian National JOTA Organizer Mr. Peter V. Hughes, 58 Preston Street, Como, WA 6152, Australia.

Last-minute questions.

This circular is the last information you receive before the JOTA weekend. Should National JOTA Organizers have any last-minute questions, ask your radio operator to send a message via the amateur packet-radio network. For the # fill out 1,2,3 or 4. This will get you a uuencoded file. After uudecoding you will need to unzip the file to obtain the original picture files in PCX format.

JOTA information is contained in two text files which you can obtain by sending:

Again, for the # fill out 1 or 2. Both files are ASCII text files.

Here are the side events to the Worldwide Jamboree on the Air, which will be held on October 15-16 on the amateur radio frequencies worldwide. More details on JOTA 94 and the frequencies used can be found on ftp.ethz.ch in the directory rec.scouting/worldwide.

(Note: this is an extract of the upcoming release of rec.scouting FAQ#2 on worldwide scouting. Since JOTA is so close, I decided not to wait until the normally scheduled posting)

At this time, I've received the announcements for three Internet Happenings to be held during JOTA 94 (October 15-16):

A. JAMBOREE ON THE IRC (JOTIRC)

IRC stands for Internet Relay Chat. IRC is devoted to just "type-talking" with other users around the world. You join what they call a channel (similar to AOL's rooms, if you're familiar) and type words which appear on

the channel. Everyone on that channel receives your words and can respond.

The software needed is basically a client. Clients can be obtained from many

ftp sites. See Scott Yanoff's "Internet Services" list on

alt.internet.services for public IRC clients, or find out if your own system has the client installed by typing the following from your UNIX prompt:

irc /join #scouting For more information on IRC, anonymous FTP to: cs.bu.edu:/irc/support/tutorial\*

One of the permanent channels on IRC is #scouting, which will be the central meeting point for JOTIRC participants.

#### **B. CIBER CAMPAMENT**

The mexican scouts have set up a local chat server called "Ciber Campament". While it is set up for JOTA 94, the server is already up and running today.

To connect, telnet to 129.108.3.7 on port 7777 (type 'telnet 129.108.3.7 7777' from your UNIX or PC host, or use NCSA Telnet from a Macintosh). You can log in with any alias and any password.

#### C. E-MAIL JOTA 94

5 watts a lot of the time. Since I am running on battery power only this also tends to extend the running time. For the first time, internet activities will be part of the official JOTA programme!!

Geneva, August 1995.

To: National JOTA Organizers (NJO's) International Commissioners National Amateur Radio Organizations

38th Jamboree-On-The-Air, 21 - 22 October 1995.

This is a final reminder that the 38th JOTA will be held over the weekend of 21 and 22 October 1995.

Details of the JOTA organization were already published in our first JOTA circular 10/95, issued in May 1995. [Note: available in the Scouts-L archives on internet under JOTA 1CIRC95]. Please read this circular again and check it for important details. The current circular contains some last-minute information.

The JOTA is a world-wide event. Units may operate for 48 hours, from Saturday 00.00 h until Sunday 24.00 h local time. Due to the world's time differences, this period is not the same for everyone. To determine the times at which you can most likely contact a certain part of the world, calculate the time difference and ask your amateur radio operator about the radio propagation prediction (a sort of weather forecast for radio waves).

Members of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) are kindly invited to take part in the JOTA and enjoy this

international event together with the Scouts.

### UN50 programme

The United Nations celebrate their 50th Anniversary this year. Several activities will be organised to commemorate this anniversary. The official anniversary date is October 24, two days after the JOTA. As you know, the World Organisation of the Scout Movement (WOSM) cooperates with several UN agencies on various issues and in different parts of the world. The following activities are organised for the 38th JOTA to commemorate the UN 50th anniversary:

 HB9S, the World Bureau's station, will transmit a message from UN Secretary General Butros Gali and/or other officials. Exact transmission times and frequencies are indicated below.
A set of projects is offered to all scouts taking part in the JOTA. Details were already presented in the May JOTA circular, no 10/95. The results of these projects can be presented to the National UN50 Committee in each country on the official celebration day October 24th.

#### JOTA badge

A cloth badge with the new Radio-Scouting logo has been produced. It was introduced at the World Jamboree. The badge can now be ordered via your National Scout Shop. The World Bureau's order number is 91211

#### **HB9S** activities.

The World Scout Bureau's radio station HB9S will operate from Geneva, most of the Saturday and Sunday, with short breaks during the night. Transmitters will be on the air simultaneously on the 10/15/20 metre, 160/80/40 metre and 0.7/2 metre bands. The station manager Yves Margot, HB9AOF, will be assisted by Richard Middelkoop, PA3BAR, World Bureau staff members and an international team of scout radio amateurs.

HB9S will transmit a JOTA message delivered by UN Secretary General Mr. Butros Gali and/or other officials, according to the following schedule on Saturday 21 October:

14.290 MHz	09.00 GMT
14.290 MHz	14.00 GMT

07.090 MHz	14.15 GMT
14.290 MHz	18.00 GMT

Making a contact with HB9S takes some patience in practice. Usually many stations are calling at the same time. Please follow the instructions given by the operators and do not interfere with ongoing contacts. The operators will do the best they can to make contact with scout stations world-wide and speak to scouts in as many languages as possible.

JOTA goes digital.

Communication via computers increases in popularity and importance in today's society in many countries. The Jamboree On The Air is the annual communication weekend of the World Organization of the Scout Movement. What better occasion to try a new experiment with computer communications. The idea is as follows.

There are 2 different networks available for digital communications via computers during the 38th JOTA.

- z Internet, an international network operating via telephone lines to which many other data networks are connected. The possiblitities that internet can offer to scouts have been described in some detail in the latest World JOTA Report. The use of internet does NOT require an amateur radio licence, merely a connection to the telephone network.
- z Packet-radio, an international network set up by radio amateurs using radio links to connect nodes in the network. Since data is transmitted by radio, the use of this network DOES require an amateur radio licence.

What you have to do is the following:

1. Connect a personal computer to one of these networks. Your radio operator can assist with technical matters where needed.

2. Switch to the "conversation" mode. This is sometimes called "Chat", "IRC" or "Convers". Now you can talk to whoever is on the same channel at that time. Use a channel identified as "scouting" or "JOTA".

3. Find about 4 or 5 other scout groups on this channel who would like to form a "Digital working group" with you. Scouts from at least 3 different countries are needed. Think of an original name for your group. Collect all electronic addresses of your group members.

4. Select a discussion topic of the UN50 projects list that was published in the May JOTA circular no. 10/95.

5. Discuss this topic with your group members by using private electronic mail. This means you only send messages to your group members.

6. Make a summary of the results.

7. Send this summary, along with the name of your Digital working group, via electronic mail to the World Scout Bureau in Geneva. The address is

for internet: worldbureau@scout.gn.apc.org

for packet: HB9AOF @ HB9IAP.

The best summaries may be used for presentation to the United Nations at the anniversary celebrations directly after the JOTA. The summaries will also be included in the World JOTA Report which will be published after the event.

National JOTA Reports.

JOTA organizers are requested to send a report to the World Scout Bureau soon after the event. Enclosed with this circular is the report form for the 38th JOTA. It is intended for use by the National JOTA Organizer (NJO) but it may be used also by individual units if a country has no NJO.

What is a good report? A National JOTA Report gives an impression of what the JOTA was like in your country. It contains ideas and comments, suggestions for future programmes and describes the most important and interesting contacts that were made. A summary of it will be published in the World JOTA Report, so others may benefit from it. The figures that are requested on the report form will be used to compile some statistics. A reasonable estimate would be appreciated if they cannot be specified accurately. Please take a few moments to fill out this report form and feel free to include any other information on separate papers.

The World Report editor would very much appreciate it if you could send your additional report text in English on a computer disk. You may use any MS-DOS or Macintosh formatted disk with the text in ASCII format or formatted according to any popular word processor, like Wordperfect, MS-Word, Wordstar or similar.

Send your report to the World Scout Bureau before the 31st of December 1995 !!

4th European Radio-Scouting Seminar.

The fourth Radio-Scouting Seminar for National JOTA Organizers in the European Region takes place 19 - 21 April 1996, at Gilwell Park in the United Kingdom. Mark your diary. For further information contact the European Regional Office in Brussels.

Last-minute information.

This circular is the last information you receive before the JOTA weekend. If there is any last-minute information of general interest, it will be distributed electronically. Check the SCOUTS@WW directory of your local packet-radio bbs and the SCOUTS-L mailing list on internet.

Finally.

The JOTA is an excellent opportunity to meet Scouts, Guides and others from many countries. Exchange ideas, learn about other cultures and habits and make new friends. This year's JOTA provides the opportunity for an interesting weekend programme. I hope that this Jamboree On The Air will once again give its participants the experience of the International Brotherhood of World Scouting and will contribute to mutual understanding and respect. I wish you all a most enjoyable weekend.

#### WHAT IS NATIONAL SCOUTING ONLINE WEEK (NSOW)?

NSOW is an event aimed on promoting the use of PCs to communicate with others around the world. This can be done very simply with any standard home computer along with a modem. A modem is a device which converts binary information into an analogue signal that can then be transmitted over the normal voice-carrying telephone lines. Many new PCs bought today come bundled with a modem included, so Scouting online is bound to increase over the coming years.

There are a number of Scouters already online, many of whom are well known to other Scouters online. These same few people have got together to organise this event.

### HOW WILL THE EVENT WORK?

The event is centred around an already popular event, Jamboree on the Air (JOTA). Several years ago, Scouters also got together to start Jamboree on the Internet (JOTI) but this seems to have died down somewhat.

During the week leading up to JOTA (Monday-Friday), Scouts (from all Sections) will have the opportunity to compose E-mail message; either on paper to be transferred to PC later or directly into the software if you can get your machine to the Scout Hut or get the kids to your office! This helps the children make new friends around the world and also works towards their badge work.

We are already spreading the word about this event in order to get links underway.

Over the JOTA/JOTI weekend (the final two days of NSOW) will be a number

of IRC sessions. IRC (Internet Relay Chat) enable many users to chat in real time across the Internet using simple software which is freely available. This will take place in the #scouting channel at the following times:

Saturday 21st October Sunday 22nd October

1200GMT (1pm BST)	1000GMT (11am BST)
1600GMT (5pm BST)	1600GMT (5pm BST)

All are welcome to join in and there will be some more experienced users online who will be able to help out if you have any problems.

OK! But I am sure there must be someone local with Internet access - ask them! I am sure they would only be too pleased to help. If you are still stuck, then forward your message to ScoutNet UK where they can be distributed on your behalf. Messages can be sent by mail, fax, or uploaded to the system. Please contact ScoutNet UK beforehand.
